#### STIPULATIONS OF THE PARTIES

The parties agree and stipulate as to the following:

I.

This is a criminal trial that will be tried before a jury. The Prosecution is being made by and in the name of the State of Texoma. Irion Wilbarger is the Defendant. The Defendant has been charged by indictment with the criminal offense of aggravated robbery. This will be a bifurcated trial. The parties will only try the issue of guilt or innocence. Should the Defendant be found guilty, there will be a separate trial on the issue of punishment at some future date. An appropriate punishment or the range of punishment is, therefore, not at issue in this trial and is not to be argued or raised in any manner at trial. Each person who is a witness has been properly advised of their constitutional rights.

II.

The Information reads as follows:

In the name and by the authority of the State of Texoma, the Criminal District Court of Landry County, in said court at said Term, do present an information that one Irion Wilbarger, on or about the 22<sup>nd</sup> day of May, 2012, in Landry County and the State of Texoma, by use or exhibition of a firearm, did commit the crime of aggravated robbery, in the County of Landry, located within the State of Texoma, against the peace and dignity of the State. Signed by A. C. Ducey, the Criminal District Attorney of Landry County, Texoma.

III.

There are no defects or infirmities in the information, and none may be argued. Defendant has been properly warned of all rights, appropriate bail was set, and said bail has been posted. There is no defense of entrapment in this case.

Irion Wilbarger's statement was given freely and voluntarily, and all of the legal requirements for the taking of said statement have been met. Wilbarger's state and federal constitutional rights, including the right against self-incrimination, right to counsel, and right to

due process of law, are not at issue with regard to the statement. The court has both subject matter and *in personam* jurisdiction over the parties. All questions of fact are being submitted to a jury. Questions of law will be decided by the court.

Dallam Brewster's criminal history includes misdemeanor convictions for petty theft, simple assault and shoplifting.

Entrapment is not a defense to the charges in this case, and is no longer recognized as a defense to any matter in Texoma.

IV.

All exhibits included in the case materials are authentic and are accurate copies of the originals. No objections to the authenticity of the exhibits will be entertained. The only exhibits to be used at trial are those included in the case packet. The signatures on the witness statements and on all other documents are authentic. The Addenda are signed on the day of trial, and no continuances have been granted in this case.

An exhibit that may qualify as a business record, such as reports from institutions, qualifies as a business record under the Rules of Evidence.

V.

Dallam Brewster, Shelby Erath Newton, and Tyler Grimes are to testify on behalf of the Prosecution. They may not testify for or be called on behalf of Defendant. Irion Wilbarger, Carson Bell, and Bailey "Maverick" Callahan are to testify on behalf of Defendant. They may not testify for or be called on behalf of the Prosecution.

The male pictured in Exhibits 6, 7, and 8 is positively identified as Kerr Bandera.

VI.

The Prosecution must prove the following elements beyond a reasonable doubt:

1) That Defendant, by use of exhibition of a firearm, did commit the offense of aggravated robbery.

VII.

The following instructions will be submitted to the jury:

The occurrence in question made the subject of this prosecution is the events of May 22, 2012 in which Defendant, Irion Wilbarger, is alleged to have committed, with the use or exhibition of a firearm, the offense of aggravated robbery.

All persons are presumed to be innocent, and no person may be convicted of an offense unless each element of the offense is proved beyond a reasonable doubt. The fact that a person has been arrested, confined or indicted for, or otherwise charged with, an offense gives rise to no inference of guilt at trial. The law does not require a defendant to prove his innocence or produce any evidence at all. The presumption of innocence alone is sufficient to acquit the defendant, unless the jurors are satisfied beyond a reasonable doubt of the defendant's guilt after careful and impartial consideration of the evidence.

The prosecution has the burden of proving the defendant guilty, and it must do so by proving each and every element of the offense charged beyond a reasonable doubt. If it fails to do so, you must acquit the defendant. It is not required that the prosecution prove guilt beyond all possible doubt; it is required that the prosecution's proof excludes all "reasonable doubt" concerning the defendant's guilt.

A "reasonable doubt" is a doubt based on reason and common sense after a careful and impartial consideration of all the evidence in the case. It is the kind of doubt that would make a reasonable person hesitate to act in the most important of his own affairs.

Proof beyond a reasonable doubt, therefore, must be proof of such a convincing character that you would be willing to rely and act upon it without hesitation in the most important of your own affairs. In the event you have a reasonable doubt as to the defendant's guilt after considering all the evidence before you, and these instructions, you will acquit him/her and say by your verdict "Not guilty."

A person is criminally responsible if the result would not have occurred but for his conduct, operating alone or concurrently with another cause, unless the concurrent cause was clearly sufficient to produce the result and the conduct of the actor is clearly insufficient.

"Aggravated Robbery" is when a person commits robbery as defined and he:

- (1) causes serious bodily injury to another, or
- (2) uses or exhibits a deadly weapon....

"Robbery" is when a person commits the offense of theft and, with the intent to obtain or maintain control of the property, he:

- (1) intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes bodily injury to another; or
- (2) intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly threatens or places another in fear of imminent bodily injury or death.

"Theft" is when a person unlawfully appropriates property with the intent to permanently deprive the owner of said property. Appropriation of property is unlawful if it is without the owner's effective consent.

VIII.

Applicable Penal Code Sections:

Texoma Penal Code Section 3.03(1) states: "Conduct is justified when the actor reasonably believes his conduct to be required or authorized to assist a public officer in the performance of his duties, notwithstanding that the officer exceeded his legal authority."

Texoma Penal Code Sec. 7.02(1)(a)(iii) (Responsibility for Conduct of Another): "(iii) A person is criminally responsible for an offense committed by another if: ... acting with the intent to promote or assist the commission of the offense, he solicits, encourages, directs, aids, or attempts to aid the other person to commit the offense."

IX.

The Charge of the Court is accurate in all respects, and no objections to the Charge will be entertained.

X.

The following issue will be submitted to the jury:

On May 22, 2012, did Defendant, with the use or exhibition of a firearm, commit the offense of aggravated robbery?

#### FACT STATEMENT OF DALLAM BREWSTER

My name is Dallam Brewster and I'm 23 years old. The first thing I want you to know about me is that I did wrong, and I'm trying to make it right. I'm no angel. That's the truth. But I have a one year old daughter named Angie. And I'm trying to do right by her. I'm going to do everything I can to make sure that I can be there for her. I want to be there on her wedding day, and there's nothing I won't do to protect her.

 That's how I got into all this mess in the first place. I went to high school with Irion Wilbarger's cousin, and we used to play MeBox together. I met Irion at that cousin's house a few months ago. Everyone calls Irion Ronnie. As it got later and later that night, we started to talk. Ronnie's real easy to talk to. Good listener. And I was saying how I didn't know if I'd be able to make it. I was failing world history, and some other stuff and probably wasn't gonna graduate. I was let go from my job at the Patterson Autoworks Distribution Center because I couldn't show up on time, and when I did, sometimes I was a little unfocused. And I owed some people some money. From some stuff. But that's another story.

And then there's Angie. Right now, we live with my mom, and she's taking care of Angie and paying the bills. But that's not right. I should be able to get a job, keep a job and pay the bills. Patterson Autoworks was just about the only place that would hire me, once I got out of jail. Kid stuff, really, but no one wants to hire someone who spent a couple months in Landry County for jacking some stuff and some shoplifting and assault. Never any felony anything, though. And that's what I told Ronnie.

So it's late one night. And we're hanging out. And Ronnie's like, "Hey, I got an idea." So I'm like, "what?" And then Ronnie tells me about this idea to grab some cigarettes out the back of a truck at the truck depot, Crawfish or something. Real easy like. Ronnie knew someone who knew a guy who knew when the cigarettes would be there. No one gets hurt, just get a bolt cutter, open the back of a truck, grab some, and then sell them on the street. No victims, even. Cigarette companies got crazy money. Wouldn't miss a few cartons. And we could sell them, and we'd split the money three ways. So that's like, what, a few hundred bucks a person easy. Not even really a crime. I could pay back those dudes who I owed. And be able to start fresh with Angie. So I said, "Sure, yeah, whatever." Didn't mean for it to go like this.

So I didn't even think about it much after that. Then one day, Ronnie was like, "You know that thing we was gonna do? We do it tonight." So I just showed up. Didn't think it was all that big a deal. All I wanted to do was grab a few cigarettes. So I just went along. Never meant no harm. Ronnie picked me up and we went to Bandera's apartment. There, Bandera and Ronnie laid out the whole plan.

So we get to the truck stop and Bandera has bolt cutters and we make a hole in the fence away from the guard shack. Hole wasn't that big, but we all got through. Ronnie takes us straight to the truck with the cigarettes and before I know it, Ronnie is crowing about another truck loaded with MePads. So Ronnie says, "Forget the cigarettes, we're hunting MePads tonight, gang!" One of 'em starts to hotwire the truck and all of a sudden, out of nowhere this flatfoot guard

appears. Guy had to be 70 and weighed 400 pounds if he weighed an ounce. Before I know it Wilbarger pulls a gun, gun's pushed into the guard's nose. My head was spinning. Let me tell you, the guard fainted dead away, just like that. We didn't even have to tie him up. So we took the truck and split. Ronnie told me to yank the GPS tracker off of the dash and toss it out the window, so I did. We rammed the gate open, stopped long enough to let Ronnie get the car and Kerr and I followed Ronnie. I never saw the gun again, but I knew Ronnie had said something about knowing how to shoot or something like that.

Ronnie leads us to this steel frame warehouse that used to have something in it but is now empty in this really scary part of town. Sure enough, the warehouse is abandoned, so we pull in and shutter the place. We open the truck and Bandera hands Ronnie a few of the MePads. Ronnie splits to meet the fence – telling us to sit tight and wait for more instructions. Even gave us the fence's name, a dude called Deaf Smith. Well, we're sitting there in this dark warehouse for like forever and we hear the sirens and see lights. Both of us jet out of the warehouse, but there are cops everywhere. I can't even make it 10 feet, and I'm fast! I swear, as they take me down, I could see Ronnie's car a block away cutting a U-turn and ditching. Oh, and they could have made the cuffs looser.

So it's even later, and I'm in a room with some cop, and I don't know who this cop is. But this cop knows about Angie. And this cop knows about all that stuff I did before I went to jail the last time. And tells me that Kerr was saying that I planned all this. Which I totally didn't. And I wasn't going to let Ronnie get away scot-free with it. And the cop said that if I just tell what happened, they could make sure that I could be with Angie, and no one was mad at me and stuff. Even gave me a bottle of water and a breakfast taco. And some tater tots.

And that's why I'm here. I just want to tell the truth cause it ain't like Ronnie says. And even though I did some stuff before that I'm not proud of, and even though I was gonna take a few cigarettes or MePads or whatever from some guys who wouldn't have missed them, I didn't do like they say. And now I hear that Ronnie says it was all me, when it was them and stuff. So that's really all I wanna say. And the cops said that if I said it and tell the truth, that things would be okay for me and Angie.

#### FACT STATEMENT OF SHELBY ERATH NEWTON

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My name is Shelby Erath Newton, DCePT, CSA, CSE. I am 44 years old and live in Corpuz, Texoma. I am not married and have no children, but I do have four labra doodles and seven cats. I also have a rather large collection of cellular phones, many of which have great historical significance. I am currently working on cataloging the collection, with a goal of opening the first cell phone museum in Texoma sometime in 2013. Or 2014.

I am a digital investigator and an expert in cell phone tracking and signal analysis. I was pre-law in college and have a bachelor's degree in applied communications and a master's degree in cellular telephone technology, both from DiGwyn Global Institute of Technology (DiGGIT). I also have a PhD in global positioning systems (GPS) analysis from Judy Jay University. I am certified by the Association of Certified Cell Phone Technicians (ACCePT) as a Diplomat in Cell Phone Technology (DCePT). I am also a Certified Cell Phone and GPS Signals Analyst (CSA) and a Certified Steganography Examiner (CSE). My work also involves geographic information systems (GIS) and I have taken, and taught, numerous GIS courses. I am quite familiar with legal issues as a result of my pre-law studies and often testify as an expert witness on various subjects, from cell phone systems to mapping systems to comparative law issues. I have a passing familiarity with electromagnetic fields, RFID technology, and bovine scatology and occasionally consult on those topics as well. With my education and experience, you could say I know a little about a lot.

I have been asked to give expert testimony in this case. Let me start by saying I know nothing about the criminal acts of the accused other than what I've been told by the prosecuting attorneys. My charge was to review and interpret cell phone data to determine the use, including location, of a cell phone with number 555-523-4567 on the dates in question. This number is registered to Irion Wilbarger.

I should start by noting that location-based services are used by all cellular providers and can be used to identify a cell phone's geographic location. This can be done in real-time, although historical data is more often analyzed. In this case, I reviewed historical data provided to me by the Landry County District Attorney's office. That data consists of call records from Texoma Tel & Telegraph for the defendant's cell phone from 1800 hours 21 May 2012, to 1800 hours 22 May 2012. That data, which is presented in the form of a spreadsheet, is Exhibit No. 4. Unfortunately, the data is not complete. The data stop at about 0430 hours 22 May 2012 and do not resume until about 0645 hours that same day. I asked the cell phone company several times to explain this data loss, but nobody there seems to know why the data are missing, aside from calling it a technical issue. Interestingly, although all data during this time period were apparently lost, calls could be still made.

As shown by Exhibit No. 4, eighteen calls were made or received from/by the Defendant's cell phone during the time covered by the data. Those calls were made to several different telephone numbers and are summarized in Exhibit 4, which I prepared in the course of my investigation from the information I observed and relied upon.

The Cell Tower Location represents the location of the cell tower through which the Defendant's cell phone first connected at the time of the call initiation. Of course, cell towers pick up signals in the general area of the tower. An area may also be covered by several towers. The specific range of any particular tower depends on various factors not important to the issues in this case, but it should be noted that the Cell Tower Location data are not as precise as GPS data. That said, this data still tells us the general area where the Defendant's cell phone was located at the time of the call. The Call Duration shows the duration of the call in minutes and seconds. While I do not know for sure, I believe that every call of 20 seconds would have been a call that was not answered, as that is the time out window for this area – the time frame when calls drop into voicemail and stop registering as connected. Calls in voicemail are not connected, no matter how long the message is.

The data show various calls to or from the cell phone registered to the Defendant during the time period represented by the data. In particular, the Defendant's cell phone was used to call a device registered to Bailey Callahan once at 2122, from the general vicinity of the animal shelter. The call data also shows calls to or from number 555-987-6543, which I am advised is a cell phone registered to Dallam Brewster. There is also a call to a local restaurant and calls from a device registered to Carson Bell. Finally, there are a couple of calls from blocked or private numbers, which are usually sales or political polling calls.

I have prepared Exhibit No. 5 which shows the approximate location of the Defendant's phone during certain times pertinent to my investigation. In conjunction with Exhibit 4, we are able to generally locate the Defendant's cell phone at times on 21 May and 22 May 2012. Since the Patterson area is littered with cell towers, we are able to tell generally where the Defendant's cell phone was based on which towers were collecting the calls.

Exhibit No. 5 also shows a summary the tracking location of the based on pings from the cellular phone system. Defendant's cell phone was at Defendant's home from the time the data begin at 1800, 21 May 2012 until 0244, 22 May 2012, when the data show the cell phone in route to the Kerr Bandera's home. The data show the cell phone was at the Bandera location until about 0341 when it left and stopped in the vicinity of the truck depot at 0358. The cell phone remained in that general vicinity until 0404, when the data showed it began moving and traveled to a warehouse located on Smith Street, arriving at about 0415. At 0422 the cell phone began moving again and traveled in the general direction of Green Arbor Heights. I have reviewed the various fact statements in this matter and know that a well-known fence who has associated with the Defendant in the past lives in the Green Arbor Heights area. Unfortunately, the data outage that affected the call records also affected the tracking data and all signals were lost from about 0431 until 0637. When the tracking data resumed, the cell phone was located at Defendant's home. The cell phone remained at that location and then moved to a nearby police substation.

The question may come up about compensation. As a highly qualified expert, I am of course being compensated. My standard hourly rate for pre-trial evaluation and analysis is \$375 per hour. So far, I've spent twelve hours working on this case and have billed the county \$4,500. I will send another invoice for the time spent preparing to testify at trial and actually testifying. My standard hourly rate for court appearances is \$575 per hour. I know that is a lot of money, but I am very well qualified on this and many other subjects.

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My name is Taylor Grimes. I am 36 years old and haven't married. I live at 2212 McCoy Lane in Patterson, Texoma. I am a Detective Sergeant with the City of Patterson Police Department.

**FACT STATEMENT OF TAYLOR GRIMES** 

 I first became interested in law enforcement and investigation during 8<sup>th</sup> grade when my pet chimpanzee, Miller, was stolen from his cage in my room. My father said my mother got rid of him because he creeped her out, but I never believed that. My gut instinct told me that someone stole him. I doggedly tried to track down the thief, interrogating my parents, sister and all my friends. I lost most of my friends, but the truth is more important than friends. I never found Miller, but I discovered something about myself – I was born to be an investigator.

After two years of studying law enforcement at Landry County Community College, I wanted to work for the Patterson Police Department. I applied and took the entrance exam but failed the first two times. Third time's a charm, right? The academy was great and I was amazed by the various investigative tools and methods I learned there. If only I'd known those tricks of the trade in 8<sup>th</sup> grade, I surely would have caught whoever stole my chimp. I graduated 47th out of 98 in my class.

I became a detective sergeant with the City of Patterson Police Department about a year ago, after working several years as a patrolman – too many years, if you ask me. I was determined to become a detective and knew that I would, eventually. It was my destiny.

 Early on in my detective work, my investigative techniques weren't perfect, I know. I may have been a bit too determined and sometimes failed to follow proper crime scene procedure, inadvertently overlooking some evidence such as fingerprints, and once there was a problem with the chain of custody of a murder weapon. But my superior officers alerted me to these issues, and I've learned from my mistakes. I have several solid investigations to my credit now.

On the day of this truck robbery, I was awakened at around 4:30 a.m. because I was the detective on call. I was informed of a robbery at the Crawford Truck Depot and was dispatched immediately to the scene.

I arrived at the truck depot at 4:52 a.m. and received a quick briefing from the Patterson PD officers already on the scene. I interviewed the security guard who had been assaulted by the truck thieves. He reported to me that there were three assailants, and he only remembered seeing one of them with a gun, but was unable to provide a description of any assailants. The trucking company had already reported the theft due to the unauthorized movement and provided the current GPS coordinates of the stolen truck. The coordinates placed the GPS transmitter at an abandoned warehouse in an industrial district of Patterson.

I left the depot and requested additional backup to meet me near the old McElhaney Warehouse in the Weber District of town – a pretty shady place. I instructed the officers to use "silent approach," no lights, no sirens. We surveilled the scene at the warehouse from about a block

away and noted no activity, but low, intermittent light levels from inside the warehouse. We were able to approach and surreptitiously observe two particular individuals in the warehouse, near the truck. I ordered the officers to move in quickly from different directions so the two particular individuals could not get away. Both suspects, Dallam Brewster and Kerr Bandera, were arrested on the scene and put in separate squad cars. I instructed the officers to book them at the station for aggravated robbery and then have them sequestered in separate interrogation rooms until I arrived later to question them.

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Upon examination of the truck, I saw that the seal to the trailer door had been broken. Upon opening the trailer, I observed that very little of the product inside appeared to be missing. I was not wearing gloves when investigating the truck and opening the trailer door to see inside, because I thought that the scene had been dusted for fingerprints. Later, I found out that that crime scene unit hadn't dusted for fingerprints as they should have. Not surprisingly, after a comparison of the latent fingerprints, the only prints which could be reliably identified were mine.

Later, when I learned that the truck depot from where the truck was stolen had a video surveillance system of the point of ingress and egress, I obtained the video from the night of the truck theft. Upon review of that video, I observed the stolen truck leaving the depot, being driven through the gate and leaving the premises. I was able to observe what appeared to be three figures in the cab of the stolen truck. The time on the tape of this occurrence was 4:01 a.m.

I drove to the station where the two suspects had been separated, per my instructions. I was told that both had been Mirandized. I questioned each suspect separately. It was from this detailed examination that I learned from Brewster of the involvement of a third perpetrator, Irion Wilbarger. Kerr Bandera said nothing at all. Both Brewster and Bandera later made bail and Bandera subsequently skipped town. There is currently a warrant for Bandera's arrest, but we have been unable to locate him. If you see him, please report it to an officer.

On May 22, 2012, at 9:30 a.m., I went to the registered address for Irion Wilbarger. We intended to set up a surveillance at the Wilbarger residence when Wilbarger exited the front door of the residence and approached a car. Wilbarger got in the car and I feared we would have a chase on our hands, so we converged on the car and arrested Wilbarger for aggravated robbery. Wilbarger was later indicted on this charge.

When I made the arrest, I took custody of Wilbarger's cell phone, which Wilbarger was holding at the time of the arrest. I later obtained a search warrant to review the call log and text messages for that phone which indicated that Wilbarger was involved in the robbery and corroborated the video evidence that Wilbarger was at the scene of the robbery. I later subpoenaed the cell phone records of Wilbarger's phone and learned that Wilbarger had called Brewster and Bandera on the night of the robbery. Unfortunately, due to some event at the phone company, there was a blackout of cell data for a couple of hours after the robbery had occurred so we don't have any cell data from 4:30 a.m. to 6:35 a.m. on May 22, 2012.

It turns out that, at the time of the truck theft, the Defendant happened to be a confidential informant (CI) for the Federal Investigation Bureau (FIB). Apparently the Defendant had been

instrumental in helping FIB solve crimes similar to this one. Defendant has maintained innocence in stealing the truck. The Defendant is equally insistent that all actions were as a CI for the FIB at the time. Patterson PD was never notified by FIB, in particular Agent Bailey Callahan, of Defendant's work as a CI in my jurisdiction. Such notification is not required, but is typically extended. In fact, I didn't verify this relationship until I questioned Agent Callahan, whose phone number was listed in the Defendant's cell phone and the records from the night of the robbery. I don't know Callahan personally, but I am not surprised that FIB withheld information that was valuable to our investigation.

Further investigation through the cell phone company revealed that the calls to Brewster and Bandera by Defendant not only occurred before, during and after the robbery, but pinpointed the location of the Defendant at the times of those calls. Some of those calls were in close proximity the truck depot and other locations pertinent to the robbery. Again, the cell phone company messed up the data somehow and we don't have any location data for a couple of hours after the robbery.

Further, affiant sayeth naught.

#### ADDENDUM TO FACT STATEMENT OF TAYLOR GRIMES

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We recovered the Bill of Lading from the floorboard of the stolen truck. It appeared to have been discarded. It was recovered, but not dusted for prints. I am certain that I instructed the crime scene unit to dust. Slackers. Anyway, that is Exhibit 2, and we gave copies of it to the Defendant's lawyers months ago. We also recovered a damaged GPS unit that had been discarded from the stolen truck. There was also a GPS unit hidden in the shipment, those Orange guys don't take chances. The damaged GPS receiver was returned to Orange.

Brewster and Wilbarger each accused the other of having a gun. The guard also saw a gun. We never recovered a gun either at the truck depot, the warehouse or Wilbarger's home. The thought of an unregistered firearm makes me nervous, but I would be a year's salary that Wilbarger got rid of it at some point after the robbery.

We did not have to obtain a warrant to search Wilbarger's car, since Wilbarger was present and gave us permission. We were also performing an inventory search incident to arrest. During this search, we found three (3) unopened Orange, Inc. Mepads in the trunk of Wilbarger's car. I think Wilbarger velped something about being a CI for the FIB at that time. I probably should have included this in my original statement, but you can't expect me to be on 24-7-365, you know. And, really, that was pretty far-fetched as an explanation for aggravated robbery.

The video from the truck depot was taken into custody and placed into the Evidence Room at the Sorrels Sub-Station, Northeast District of the Patterson PD. It probably should have gone to the main headquarters, but did not. Unfortunately, the Evidence Custodian at the Sorrels Station, Brooks Hale, used that tape to record a birthday celebration and going-away party for one of the officers in the unit. Hale has since been fired.

I have nothing else to add.

#### FACT STATEMENT OF BAILEY "MAVERICK" CALLAHAN

I am Bailey Callahan, an Agent with the Federal Investigation Bureau ("FIB"). Most folks call me Maverick. I live at 7444 Fife Drive, Petro City. I am 38 years old, married, with three kids; a son, 14, and twin daughters, 10. I graduated from the University of Texoma at Petro City in 1997 with a bachelors in Criminal Justice with a minor in Print-Making. After graduation, I did a few odd jobs before applying to the Bureau in 2001. After training, I was sent to a few odd outposts out west before being transferred to the General Interstate Trailer Theft – Investigation and Recovery unit (called GITT'IR for short). Since then, I have worked for FIB GITT'IR, promoted through the ranks, and I am now the Agent with the highest stolen-trailer recapture rate in the region. FIB GITT'IR does not assign partners, and I much prefer to work alone.

Two years ago, I busted Irion Wilbarger for transporting across state lines a semi full of goods stolen from a trans-shipment terminal. I think the load back then was ergonomic chairs and bladeless fans. Anyway, I busted Wilbarger as the semi was being moved from the terminal to a drop off destination to sell the load. I only collared Wilbarger that night, but Wilbarger turned on the gang before I even had a chance to get the cuffs on. Wilbarger fully cooperated with FIB GITT'IR, giving us the names and addresses of everyone involved, and testified against them during the trials.

For that assistance, our bureau recommended and the US Attorney gave Wilbarger a deal for helping with this case, Wilbarger received probation. I believe that a condition of the plea deal stipulated Wilbarger could not break the law, or consort with any known criminals. However, we also didn't want to let a great informant go. So, for continued assistance, the deal stated that Wilbarger would continue to work trailer-theft jobs, but could not break the law without approval from FIB GITT'IR. Wilbarger would be paid based on the value of the goods recovered, with a cap of \$1,000 per conviction. It was a good deal, if you ask me. No jail time, and a job. I don't know how much Wilbarger has made on this deal, but given my track record, I bet it's a good amount.

Wilbarger and I worked jobs together for the next year and a half. With this deal, my trailer recovery rates sky-rocketed. I became Wilbarger's sole handler. Technically, I was probably supposed to get my supervisor's permission for each bust Wilbarger helped with, but after a while, it seemed like a non-issue. What with all the success we were having. I mean, I never hid anything...and in most cases, we were working with a very short timeline. Sometimes, it's just easier to ask forgiveness than permission. With Wilbarger's help and the other cases I worked alone, I recovered the most trailers in FIB GITT'IR in 2010 and 2011. I was well on my way to breaking my record for 2012, and probably a fat promotion, until Wilbarger, well, all of this.

In May of 2012, Dallam Brewster and Kerr Bandera contacted Wilbarger about stealing a cigarette shipment from the truck terminal on the east side of Patterson. Bandera and Brewster apparently wanted Wilbarger to help steal the truck and act as intermediary in the sale of the goods. The plan was for Wilbarger to feign going to meet a fence, while in reality, I would get a call about the stolen truck. When Wilbarger told me about this, I thought it sounded like another

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notch in the belt. I didn't bother asking my supervisor for permission since this operation was so cut and dried. Wilbarger would let me know where the truck was headed, I would park my vehicle nearby and nab both Brewster and Bandera. Trailer and goods would be recovered, Wilbarger would get a reward, and I would continue my recovery streak.

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Wilbarger told me the cigarette heist was going down the night of May 21-22. Wilbarger always uses the same cell phone, and I have that number in my phone. Wilbarger called me at 9:00 p.m. that night, and said everything was a go, and that the next call later that night would let me know where they dropped off the trailer. Typically in these terminal heists, the perps take the trailer from a terminal and park it a few miles away in an isolated location. They take a sample of the goods to a buyer, and once a deal is negotiated, the perps bring the truck to the buyer. This provides ample time for me to cross paths with the trailer and either apprehend the perps, or at least recover the trailer and goods.

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After I talked to Wilbarger, I sat tight at my home office and waited. I set my phone on loud and got in bed. I woke up at about 4:00 a.m. and had not gotten any calls, so I went back to sleep. I got up at about 6:30, and called Wilbarger then. No answer. At that point, I figure something went wrong with the plan, and the theft was not happening that night, and so I got up and got ready for work and headed in.

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I'm driving my desk that morning when I got a call from Taylor Grimes, a detective with the Patterson Police Department, asking me if Wilbarger is an informant for the FIB. I confirmed that Wilbarger was. Then Grimes informs me that our bosses will be talking, and starts going on about local and federal agencies working together and collaboration and whatnot. I finally get it out of Grimes that Wilbarger was collared about an hour earlier for aggravated robbery of a truckload of MePads. Aggravated robbery is not Wilbarger's M.O., and to my knowledge Wilbarger does not have a gun. Besides, possession of a weapon is prohibited under the terms of the probation and our CI deal.

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My supervisor, Lee Leon, called me shortly after I got off the phone with Grimes and read me the riot act. I am currently under investigation by the FIB Inspector General for not obtaining supervisor approval for my operations with Wilbarger as well as for failing to follow protocol and not informing the Patterson Police Department that Wilbarger was an informant. But really, how good is any informant that everyone *knows* is a snitch!?

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These are all the facts that I can remember about this case.

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#### FACT STATEMENT OF CARSON BELL

My name is Carson Bell. I am best friends with Irion Wilbarger, the Defendant in this case - I call Irion "Ronie," most everyone does. We have known each other since we turned over trash cans in the school lunch room in elementary school. We got into lots of trouble together all the way through school, but after I graduated, I turned things around and got my college degree and a post graduate degree. I have my own business now in Patterson City as a vet and taxidermist. I call my business "CertainTeed Pet Return, Dead or Alive".

Ronie did not do as well though. Ronie had a lot of difficulty staying out of trouble. But I have always been there for Ronie. We have always been good friends and trusted each other. A few years ago, we were even going to get matching tattoos, but Ronie said we better not, because it would be an identifying mark and could be a problem someday. I have no idea what that meant. But sometimes when Ronie is around and things are going good, we put on matching temporary tats, just as a goof.

Ronie has never been real stable. After dropping out of high school, Ronie had lots of odd jobs and then joined the Marines. That didn't work out, but I don't think that was Ronie's fault. Some people just have it in for other people, you know what I mean. Anyway, when Ronie came back to Patterson after the Marines, I had a place and we lived together because, you know how parents can be, and Ronie's folks did not exactly extend the red carpet. Really ever since then, I have purposefully kept a 2 bedroom 2 bath apartment so Ronie will always have a place to stay. I think my place is Ronie's only real home now.

I know about Ronie's arrest a couple of years ago and it surprised me because I know that Ronie is not a criminal, no matter what anyone else thinks or says. I testified for Ronie in that trial and because of my testimony, Ronie got probation. I think that was fair because no matter what anyone else says, Ronie would never do any of the things that they say, you know, stealing When Ronie was staying with me, we never had boxes of stuff around the apartment and Ronie never brought anything suspicious home. Actually, I bought most of Ronie's clothes and stuff. It seemed like Ronie never had anything.

I know Ronie is not really a criminal. I go to the animal shelter every Monday evening to provide vet care to the animals there and Ronie sometimes goes with me. Ronie likes to play with the animals and is especially helpful when we enter information about my work onto the shelter's MePad.

For some reason, Ronie has always had trouble getting and keeping steady work. I have considered offering Ronie a job at my place, but I have plenty of employees, and Ronie doesn't really have the necessary training in veterinary medicine or taxidermy. I am glad Ronie seems interested in the work at the shelter though, maybe it could lead to something better someday. I worry about Ronie's work stuff all the time. So when Ronie told me about starting to do undercover work, I was really glad. It was a real good career move and seemed like solid employment. I think Ronie's street smarts makes undercover work a natural fit.

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On the night of the robbery, Ronie and I went to the shelter at about 8 or 8:30 and got home around 10, or maybe 10:30. I think we got home before 10:30 because Ronie turned on the TV to watch the news and ordered a pizza – Ronie asked if I wanted any. I wasn't hungry, so I went to my room and went to bed. I woke up at around 4:30 or 4:45 because I thought I heard a door slam. I got up and could tell that the TV was still on. I figured Ronie had been in the living room, so I got up to tell Ronie to go on to bed. The TV was on, but it was on a different channel than when I had gone to bed. Ronie was not in the living room and the bedroom door was closed, so I assumed Ronie was in bed sleeping already. I turned off the TV and went back to bed.

I woke up at my usual time, 6:45 a.m. and started getting ready for work. I made coffee and started my breakfast; biscuits and sausage gravy. I was just about to leave for work at 8:30 when Ronie came out of the bedroom and said, "Hey, I can't find my cellphone, give it a call." That way, we could look for it while it was ringing. I was a little irritated because doing all this was going to make me late opening my clinic, but I dialed the number on my phone. We didn't hear it ring so Ronie went out to the car. A few minutes later, Ronie came back in escorted by the Patterson police. I was just shocked. I could not believe that my friend would be involved in anything like this crime. As I have said, Ronie is not a bad person, and I do not think Ronie would have committed armed robbery, and most certainly would not have planned it. Ronie was working for the sheriff after all.

This is my sworn testimony in this matter.

I know I didn't like the looks of Ronie's friends and I wish I would have asked Ronie not to bring those friends around. Most of the time, they didn't come around when I was there. They weren't mean or anything, but I just didn't like the looks of them.

I did not look out the window at 4:30, so I don't know if Ronie's car was there. But, the TV channel had been changed and I'm sure Ronie was home then.

#### FACT STATEMENT OF IRION WILBARGER

My name is Irion Wilbarger. My friends call me "Ronie." My enemies never call. I am 21 years old and live at 2101 Ross Ave. here in Patterson with my friend, Carson Bell. I was born and raised in Patterson by my momma and poppa. I had "behavior problems" in junior high and high school. Seems like I was always getting into trouble with my teachers and running around with the "wrong crowd," according to my teachers and parents. I had enough of their attempts to discipline me and dropped out of high school at the beginning of my senior year. After that, I went through a lot of odd jobs like working at fast food restaurants and construction before deciding to join the US Marines so I could "Be All That I Wanted to Be." And I wanted to be a jet fighter pilot. I washed out of the Marines in about three months with an "administrative discharge." It was so bogus. I didn't like all the rules, like when to go to bed and get up, and following orders. (I wasn't going to peel no potatoes. Besides, when was I going to get to fly and shoot things???)

After being discharged from the Marines, I tried house painting, but lost that job because I would stay up all night with friends more or less hanging out. I just couldn't manage to get to work the next day. My parents kicked me out of their house because I wouldn't go back to school, didn't have a job, and hung out at the house all day, playing my guitar and just hanging out, and watching "Coppers" on TV. They should have been grateful that I wasn't getting into trouble anymore!

I had been staying with Carson for several months while I was looking for a job. Carson is my BFF. Carson and I go all the way back to grade school. We used to goof around a lot and get into trouble all the time in elementary, middle and high school. We spent a lot of time with our parents sitting in school hallways outside principals' offices. Carson got serious after high school and now has a good job as a veterinarian/taxidermist and a 2-bedroom apartment. We still are BFFs and go on double dates lots. Carson thinks I have a lot of potential as a musician and just need to find my way. Deep down I know I am a good person, and with my talent and a few breaks, I could win "America's Most Talented," easy greasy!

After the Marines, I began hanging out with a group that was into stealing, especially truckloads of goods from local truck terminals. They gave me some "on the job training," if you know what I mean, and I learned how to fence stuff. I made a few bucks that kept me in guitar strings and stuff. Carson had no idea I was into that stuff.

My one conviction occurred almost two years ago, when I was caught driving a stolen 18-wheeler in another state. My "buddies" got away, but I was busted by the feds. To get probation, I ratted out my buddies. I am still on probation for the crime. My "friends" are in prison. You gotta do what you gotta do.

After pleading guilty, I was approached by Special Agent Bailey Callahan with the feds. Agent Callahan — Bailey told me to use "Maverick" because that's what Bailey was — asked me to become a confidential informer (known in the trade as a "CI"). The deal was that I would notify Maverick when I heard that a theft was going down. If Maverick gave me the okay, I'd infiltrate the gang, and let Maverick know when and where the goods were to be stolen and fenced. Then,

Maverick would swoop in, bust everyone and get all sorts of promotions and glory and stuff. I'd get a percent of the value of the goods and truck recovered! This CI gig was crazy good! I now had a job as a real crime-fighter with good money prospects, and maybe a chance down the road to become a federal agent myself! The bummer was that I couldn't tell anyone except Carson, who I'd trust with my life. But, now I could hang with my "hooligan friends" (as my mother refers to them) with the blessing of the feds and make some Benjamins! As a CI with the feds, they won't let me can't carry a gun – a real downer! Also, I can't get involved in a crime without Maverick's approval in advance, and I can't be involved in any crime where life is put at risk, such as an armed robbery. Unfortunately, Maverick won't let me shoot people.

Maverick and I were a primo crime-fighting team. Over about 18 months, we successfully busted four or five gangs of "perps," earning me a cool \$14,000, tax free!

In late January this year, I was approached by Dallam Brewster and Kerr Bandera. They are high school dropouts who hang together. Brewster is a small time thief always looking to score big. Really delusional! Brewster has been in and out of jail for burglary, larceny and receiving stolen goods. Nothing big time. A real loser. "Coppers" is a certain stop someday, face down on the hood of a cop car! Bandera is Brewster's "remora," if you know what I mean.

Brewster and Bandera were going to steal an 18-wheeler from the Crawford Truck Terminal in Patterson and wanted my help getting to and from the terminal and fencing the goods. I was cool with that. This was perfect for a Maverick sting and I could make some buck-os. Brewster had it all planned. We would go to the terminal in my car, cut the fence, find this truck loaded with cigarettes Brewster claimed to know about, hot-wire the truck, and leave with fake authorization papers that Bandera had forged. After we'd left the terminal, I would follow the truck in my car to a concealed area near the abandoned McElhaney Pet Rock and Mood Ring warehouse on Stafford Drive. I was supposed to have contacted the fence in advance. (Of course, I hadn't.) I was supposed to take a "sample" of the stolen goods to the fence and negotiate the deal. Brewster and Bandera would stay with the truck. When a deal was reached, I'd drive back and lead them to the fence. We'd split the cash and disappear. Sounded simple enough. So I let them think I was gung ho.

Shortly after Brewster first called, I called Maverick. Maverick seemed real pleased and okayed my involvement in the heist. Maverick and I agreed, as usual, that I would call a few hours before the heist to confirm that it was still on. Then, I'd call after the heist to say when and where the truck was hidden. Maverick and a backup team of feds would swoop in and "roll them up" (as they say on "Coppers"). I asked if this bust could be videoed for some reality show but Maverick chilled the idea. Maverick said if I was shown on TV cuffing somebody, it would blow my cover. I didn't think of that. Someday, maybe.

Brewster called me Sunday, May 20, 2012, and told me that the Crawford terminal job was going down that Monday night after midnight. I immediately relayed this to Maverick. I always called Maverick from my cell phone. It was the only way we communicated. Maverick said they'd be ready.

Around 8:00 p.m. on Monday night, May 21, I went with Carson to the animal shelter. Carson talked me into going there most Mondays to help care for the animals. I love dogs, especially Rottweilers. They are so cool. While I was there, Brewster called me to tell me to bring my car to Bandera's house at 3:00 a.m. that night (Tuesday) and to wear dark clothes. They'd be waiting for me there, ready to do "the job." I slipped out into the parking lot and called Maverick around 9:00 p.m. to report that the job was still on for later that night. Carson and I returned home around 10:00. Just before 3:00 a.m., I slipped quietly out of the house so as to not wake Carson, and drove to Bandera's house.

But, it went wrong and it went wrong fast. Brewster, Bandera and I drove to the terminal in my car, parked it a block away, and cut through the chain link fence. It was just before 4:00 a.m. Tuesday. Even the owls were asleep. We got to the trailer Brewster said had the cigarettes, but Bandera noticed that the truck next to it had a manifest on the seat and the cab was unlocked. We looked at the manifest and saw it was for a trailer load of new MePads. This was a really big score – I mean, tens of thousands of dollars more than they planned to steal. Brewster got really torqued up and decided we'd boost the MePads instead. I was cool with this. My reward would be just that much greater when Maverick stung these knuckleheads.

But just then, when Brewster was in the cab hot-wiring the ignition, a guard with a flashlight and a pistol got the drop on me and Bandera, demanding we put our hands up and tell him what we were doing there. Brewster snuck out of the cab behind the guard and stuck a gun in his ear. The guard dropped his light, and Brewster gave a roll of duct tape to Bandera and told Bandera to tape the guard's hands behind him and his mouth shut.

I was, like, totally stunned. I had no idea Brewster was "packing." This was supposed to be a simple truck theft, not an armed robbery. I wasn't authorized by Maverick to participate in anything this serious. And for all I knew, that idiot Brewster might kill the guard. I had no choice but to go along with Brewster, though, if I was to maintain my cover. And, I was sure I'd get a medal or something now for catching some armed robbers. This could be totally cool! So, all three of us jumped into the truck hauling the MePads and busted through the gate. Just like in the movies! They let me out at my car, and I followed them to the McElhaney warehouse. It must have been about 4:15 a.m. I lied that I was going to drive to the fence, make the deal, and return to take them to the fence. But, one of them demanded to know where the fence was. To sound credible, I gave them the location of a fence that I had used once before my conviction, Deaf Smith. Bandera broke open the trailer and gave me a few MePads to show to Smith. I even took a picture of the open trailer full of MePad boxes with my cell phone "to show him." That picture is Exhibit 1.

I drove off, intending, of course, to call Maverick not only to tell where the truck and the two perps were, but also to explain how the theft became an armed robbery and how I had no choice but to go along with them to maintain my cover. Of course, Maverick would not be happy that a CI was involved in something like this. If it went public, it could be bad for Maverick and the feds. They might cancel my CI status and turn me in to the police. Then, my probation could be revoked and I might go to prison. But, since Maverick would now be busting a couple of armed robbers and recovering tens of thousands of dollars of goods, I was pretty sure I was coming out of this a hero. Heck, a super-hero!

I pulled my car over to call Maverick on my cell. I had Maverick's cell number in my phone, but not memorized or written anywhere for security reasons. I couldn't find my cell. I panicked. Without the phone, I had no idea how to contact Maverick. I think Maverick worked somewhere out of town. I knew Maverick would be mad I had not called. But I knew Maverick might be calling my cell phone ... wherever it was! And it was on silent, and was not set to vibrate. I was worried it had fallen out at the warehouse.

If they got away with the truck, I was in deep trouble. Ultimately, I assumed that Brewster, not hearing from me, would keep the truck at the warehouse that night. The cops would be looking for it by then and Brewster knew it was too risky to move it. I'd find them the next morning, and set up the sting again. So, I went to bed, planning to find my cell in the morning and getting this thing back on track. Undercover crime fighting is exhausting. I totally zonked out around 5:00 a.m. (I dreamt I was in a James Bond movie.)

Around 9 a.m., I got up and asked Carson to help me find my phone by calling my cell to see if it was nearby; maybe I could see it light up. No luck. Around 9:30 a.m., I went to my car to drive to the McElhaney warehouse to see if the truck was still there. I got in my car and was feeling around for the seatbelt when I felt my phone stuck down between the seat and back. That's where it was all along! After I got home and couldn't find my cell, I didn't drive back to the warehouse because I was afraid that I might get arrested before I could set up the sting. I ain't that dumb! I had no choice but to sit tight. And Brewster had a gun! We don't have a "land line" telephone in our apartment. We use only our cells. Who has a land line these days? Betty White?

I totally forgot that the MePads were in my trunk. I was so focused on finding my cell, I just forgot they were there. You know, since I was not really involved with the heist, I didn't think about them after Bandera put them in my trunk. It was all part of the dodge. And as for that gun that Brewster had, I have no idea where it went. But it sure wasn't mine.

My attorney thinks that I need to say that I drove from the warehouse and went straight north on Winkler to where it hits Route 66, just before you get to the river, you know, headed out of the warehouse district. You have to get on 66 there, because there isn't a bridge across the river. I just turned left and jumped on 66 and headed home. Simple.

I have nothing else to add. I'm telling the truth.


